Worli dairy plot to house aquarium too

Mumbai: The state urban development department has put the seal on setting up of an aquarium on the Worli Dairy plot by allowing "change in user" on a part of the 15-acre plot. A section of the plot has been de-reserved as Dairy and reserved for Marine Research Institute, Aquarium and Exhibition centre.

The existing administrative building of the dairy department will not be touched and will continue to be in possession of the dairy department. BMC will be the implementation authority for the institute, aquarium and exhibition centre, says the notification issued on Wednesday. Worli dairy is part of state environment minister Aaditya Thackeray's assembly constituency and in the budget last year the government announced that it would develop an international-standard aquarium and research institute. 'World's largest' Igloo Cafe in Gulmarg can seat 40 guests.

An igloo cafe, claimed to be the world's largest, has come up at the famous ski-resort of Gulmarg in Jammu and Kashmir, and has become a centre of attraction for tourists. With a height of 37.5 feet and a diameter of 44.5 feet, Syed Wasim Shah, creator of the igloo, claimed it was the world's largest cafe of its kind.

"I saw this concept in Switzerland a few years back where they have such hotels, which are equipped with sleeping facilities as well. I thought Gulmarg sees a lot of snow and why not start this concept here," Shah said. He said the biggest igloo cafe, according to the Guinness Book of World Records, is in Switzerland, and its height is 33.8 feet and diameter 42.4 feet. So, this is larger than that, Shah added.

To mark the 75 years of India's Independence, the South Delhi Municipal Corporation is set to come up with a theme park based on the 'waste-to-art' concept, at Shaheedi Park, ITO, after the civic body gave the nod for the project during its House session.

Spread across an area of 4.5 acres, the theme park will be developed at a cost of ₹29 crore. It will feature 11 replicas of prominent figures, the likes of Bhagat Singh, Chandragupta Maurya, and will have three galleries. Under the 'waste to art' concept, waste materials such as old scrap and metals are used in the making of the replicas. Apart from this, the SDMC has also given its nod for the construction of a "Bollywood park" in Jangpura, and a "dinosaur park" in Sarai Kale Khan.

Visitors to Tokyo Disney Parks Top 800 million

The cumulative number of visitors to Tokyo Disneyland and Tokyo DisneySea has topped 800 million. The Disney parks in the city of Urayasu, Chiba Prefecture, adjacent to Tokyo, reached the milestone in 38 years and 318 days, according to the firm. Tokyo Disneyland opened in April 1983. Tokyo DisneySea began to accept visitors in September 2001. The annual visitor number had been around 30 million in and after fiscal 2013, but plummeted to about 7.5 million in fiscal 2020 due partly to temporary closures amid the novel coronavirus pandemic. Work to sizably expand Tokyo DisneySea is underway, with Fantasy Springs, comprising three areas, including one themed on "Frozen," a Disney movie, slated to open in fiscal 2023.


Royal Caribbean's Wonder of the Seas sets sail with new attractions

Jamaica removes COVID-related travel authorisation from March

Visitors to Jamaica will no longer need the Travel Authorisation, and travel-related quarantine measures will no longer be required from March 1. Children 12 years and older will still need to provide a negative COVID-19 test (antigen or PCR) conducted within 72 hours prior to the date of travel at check-in.
